COLLABORATION AT NEW LEVELS

Ever since I became director of the cancer center, I have been working to enhance interactions with the KU Cancer Center (KUCC). On January 27, 2009, an agreement was signed by K-State and KU to formalize a partnership between our cancer centers.

The purpose is to foster collaboration between the cancer researchers at the two universities, recognizing their unique roles, and building on each others' strengths. Both centers will benefit from

the relationship in terms of productivity and national funding. This is a win-win situation, as we offer expertise in

basic research and they offer access to clinical material and the possibility of expediting the translation of basic research into clinical trials.

We have two agreements. The first formalizes our desire to enhance administrative cooperation at the two centers and stimulate collaboration between our scientists. Our affiliates will become adjunct members of the KUCC. The two centers will share seminars and research equipment. Representatives of each center will meet regularly to assess progress and devise strategies to encourage additional cooperation.

The second agreement insures our support of KUCC's goal to achieve NCI designation as a comprehensive cancer center. This would be a major step forward on both the research and treatment fronts.

This partnership will surely have a major impact on cancer research in Kansas. And provide significant economic benefit to our institutions, as well as to the state of Kansas. We look forward to this exciting new era of cooperation and success in our efforts to conquer cancer.


