New Director Gets Busy

has been busy talking about K-State cancer research and representing the center through:

- Presentations, tours of our new facility, and visits with friends and longtime cancer center supporters around the state

In addition, he and selected faculty also reviewed applications and approved funding for travel fellowships, equipment grants, and research assistance. He initiated the *Innovative* Research Grants program to support new researchers doing preliminary research, upon which they must often base requests for national and international extramural funding.

Also important to the center and K-State are a Dr. Denell's recent scientific achievements.

Since his appointment as Director, Dr. Denell He was one of four annual recipients of KU's Higuchi-Endowment Research Achievement Award for excellence in scientific research performed at Kansas Board of Regents institutions.

> Denell and cancer center affiliate Dr. Susan Brown applied to have the red flour beetle they use for their genetics research selected for genome sequencing. Their application to the National Human Genome Research Institute of the NIH was accepted. Very few organisms are selected for sequencing. This is a major accomplishment and testament to their influence on the usefulness of the flour beetle, now a model organism, to the genetic research community. The funds will be given to a national sequencing center, which will then forward the sequence data to K-State for interpretation.

> Dr. Denell's research, which led him to the discovery in insects of a group of genes that have proven important to human development and cancers, will be greatly benefited by this sequencing project.

Chalmers Hall Dedication

On Friday, October 24th, the new facility named in honor of Dr. John Chalmers, former K-State administrator and college dean, was officially dedicated. Chalmers created the Division of Biology, the largest academic unit in the College of Arts and Sciences, through the merger of several other life science departments. He was responsible for moving the department of biochemistry to the College of Arts and Sciences to better serve students and faculty. Chalmers was also instrumental in getting the cancer center designated by the board of regents in the late 1970's.

These units will reside in this *state-of-the-art* facility and are grateful to Dr. Chalmers for his efforts.

Outreach Efforts Increase

Educating the public about cancer, cancer prevention, and cancer research at K-State, and being a known resource to the community, are important goals of the center. We are participating in community collaborations to increase cancer awareness and knowledge, as well as accessibility to local resources for individuals and families facing cancer. Some of these outreach activities include:

- NATIONAL COLORECTAL CANCER AWARENESS MONTH (March) activities to promote early detection through regular screenings.
- **SKIN CANCER AWARENESS** activities throughout the year to teach the importance of skin protection and provide free pocket-size sunscreen packets at local outdoor events.

- NATIONAL BREAST CANCER AWARENESS Month event to encourage women 40 and older to have annual mammograms.
- **GREAT AMERICAN SMOKEOUT**, an American Cancer Society event coming up on November 20, to encourage smokers to quit for the day, and hopefully longer. The center is working with a local restaurant on a "quit cold turkey" lunch event.
- GENERAL OUTREACH at fairs and other community
 events to inform about the dangers of tobacco use and the
 importance of good nutrition and exercise in reducing risk
 of many cancers and other diseases.
